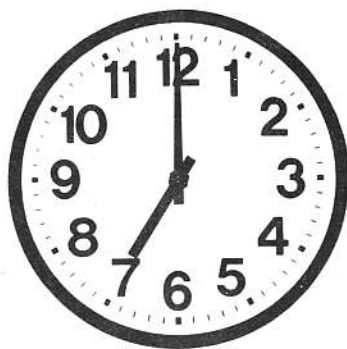

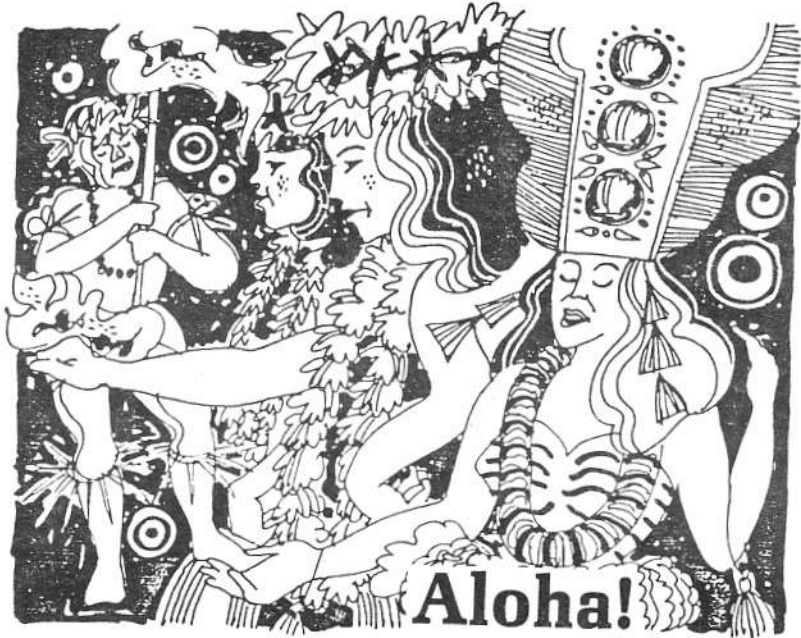
It's Volleyball season again. So all you spikers, slammers and servers sign up now for the PCC team to compete in the Travel Industry Volleyball League.

Honolulu Boy Choir To Perform



The famed Honolulu Boy Choir brings its youthful enthusiasm and 100 memorable faces to Laie for the first time in concert on the Brigham Young University - Hawaii Campus. On November 6, the traditional blowing of the conch shell will highlight the opening of the performance at 7:30 p.m. in the Aloha Center Ballroom.

The boys range in school from grades 2 through 8 and hail from approximately 80 different elementary schools throughout Oahu. They are carefully selected by audition and directed by Roy Hallman. Representing a cross-section of Hawaii's people, they come from all racial and religious groups, various family environments, urban and rural areas and the civilian and military population.

Admission for this event will be \$4.00 General, \$2.50 for High School students, and \$1.00 for children under 12. Tickets will go on sale at the Aloha Center Front Desk on Monday, November 2. Tickets may be reserved over the phone, but must be picked up one half hour before the performance. Laie Hills Are Alive With The Sound Of Music

As Christmas draws near, community members in Laie are clearing their throats and preparing to sing in the season!

Center personnel are involved in a number of choral groups that are currently rehearsing for concerts over the next few weeks.

Cultural Orientation Manager Haunani Kānaana is President of the Relief Society Choir which involves many Center women in its ranks of some 200 voices. The choir will sing at the upcoming Laie Stake Conference in the Cannon Center, presenting two numbers.

"Sing Praise to the Lord" is an emphatic proclamation of praise written by Handel, composer of the Messiah. "More Holiness Give Me" is a supplication for purity, and will be presented partly a capella.

The BYU Youth Chorus actually involves three age groupings of youth, many of whom are the children of Center employees. Directed by Carolyn Shumway, the Youth Chorus will present a concert December 11 in the BYU auditorium.

Perhaps the most exciting event of the year will be the December 5 concert in the Cannon Center which will unite the Honolulu Symphony with a 200 voice community choir. Called the Laie Choral Union, the choir is under the direction of Jim Smith, and includes many Center employees.

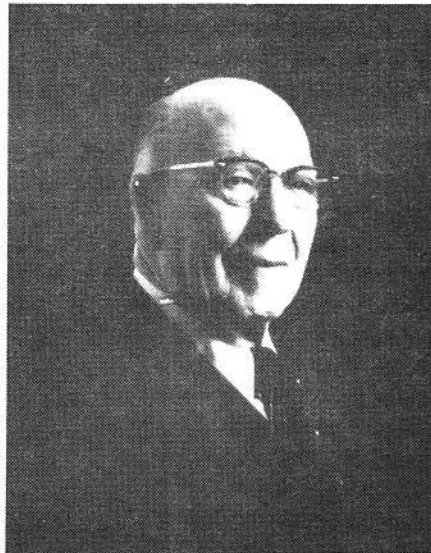
Both that program and an additional one in which the choir was asked to participate at the express invitation of the Symphony conductor Donald Johanos, will present hymns from Handels Messiah.

The second program is scheduled for December 17 at Honolulu Hale. It is a special Mayor's Christmas Concert, and it is pleasing to note that the Laie choir was chosen to participate in what can only increase the reputation of our community singers.



Introducing:

Elder Le Grand Richards



Elder LeGrand Richards, a member of the Council of the Twelve Apostles of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, has devoted over 60 years of service to the Church in positions of major responsibility.

He has filled four missions and presided over two of them. He has served as bishop of three wards, a high councilor and a stake president.

For 14 years he was the Presiding Bishop of the Church and has been a member of the Council of the Twelve since April, 1952.

Elder Richards is the author of three widely read Church books, of which "A Marvelous Work and Wonder" is perhaps the best known. Now the oldest General Authority of the Church, Elder Richards is known for his keen gospel knowledge and enthusiasm.

Professionally, he has carried on a successful real estate business most of his life.

Elder Richards is the third apostle in direct family descent. His father was President George F. Richards of the Council of The Twelve and his grandfather Franklin D. Richards was also President of the Council; and he is a nephew of Willard Richards, pioneer leader, apostle, and counselor to President Brigham Young. His mother was Alice A. Robinson.

He was born February 6, 1886, at Farmington, Utah. Later, he married Ina Jane Ashton on May 19, 1909 in the Salt Lake Temple, who passed away on December 31, 1977. They have four daughters and two sons.

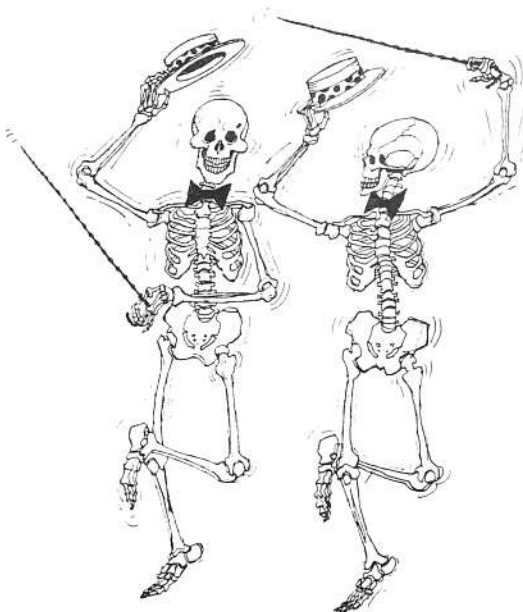

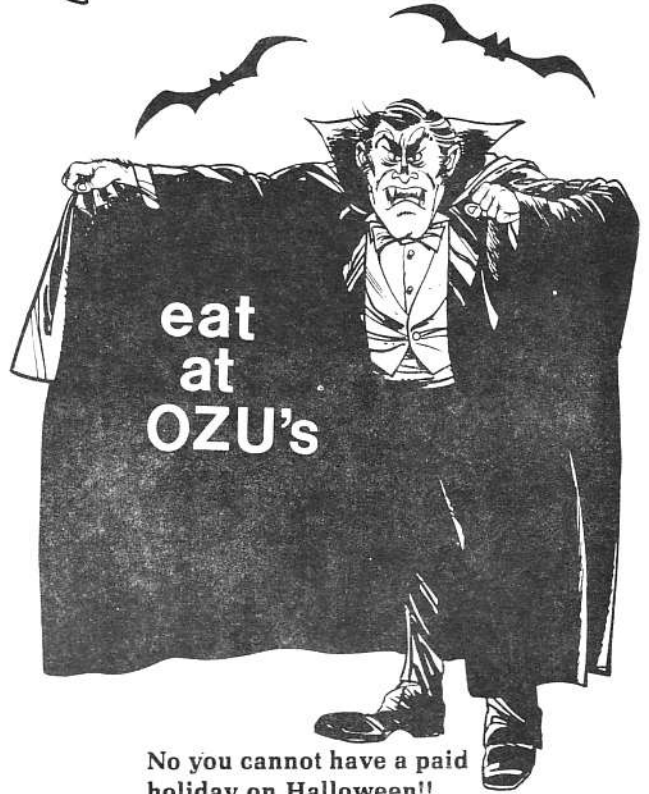

"Why tell me that a man is a fine speaker
if it not the truth that he is speaking?"
--Thomas Carlyle

Consider the following story: The Captain of a ship once entered in his log, "Mate was drunk today." When the mate found it out, he pleaded with the Captain to cross it out. He said it was the first time he'd ever been drunk and it wasn't fair. But the Captain said, "In this log we always write the exact truth."

The next week the mate kept the log. In it he wrote, "The Captain was sober today."

There is both humor and pathos in this story as we consider the implications of the mate's following of the letter of the law. As I read it recently, I noted that it was introduced with the statement: "The truth is not always honest." I disagree with that, for obviously, it is the inferences others may draw from our particular way of stating the truth which can raise questions of honesty rather than the fact of the truth itself.

Young people today insist that we "tell it like it is", which phrase also infers that if we are not reminded we might be tempted to color the facts and shade the truth. I was duly reminded of this as I read a letter to the editor in the Honolulu Star Bulletin this past Wednesday.

A woman wrote her disappointment of the Center. She compared her visit of October 1 this year with the past. "What was once an educational and cultural experience" she wrote, "is now another extension of touristy consumerism." She stated this criticism in detail: "In the 'villages' and at the show we were subjected to constant hawking. Is seemed everybody wanted to sell something: record albums, programs, sherbert in pineapples, slides, hats, weavings, baskets, fake leis, film, snacks, etc."

I smiled as I read that. Having visited the Pyramids of Cairo this summer along with other tourist attractions in Egypt and Israel, her use of the word 'hawking' in a PCC context seemed to me extreme. In English that word derives from the swooping and striking manner of a hunting hawk, and is used to describe one who solicits business by peddling small quantities of wares.

The flocks of small boys who swoop upon tourists in Cairo do, indeed, hawk many of the items this woman describes. However, here in the Center, it is misrepresenting the case to suggest that such an approach is made to our guests. Because we have been criticized in the past for not providing ready access to such things as film and cold drinks in the villages, Snack Carts are now located in adjacent areas and in all cases, the visitor must approach the carts in order to make a purchase.

It seems that our critic is over-stating the case. That is, of course, an effective method for getting attention, but it is not quite the truth. It is suggesting, by choice of words, a situation that does not really exist, and is, in every respect, the difference between the truth that "the mate was drunk today, -- and the Captain sober."
