Maoritanga Celebrated

It was a diverse group that gathered together in the Maori Village for Saturday's Waitangi Day devotional.

Included were Maori Village workers, management representatives, chiefs and supervisors from other villages, and friends from the community.

One theme in the early morning meeting united the group even in it's diversity, however, and that was pride, dignity, and respect for Maoritanga.

A number of speakers commented on the theme, first introduced by Vernice Pere, of what it means to be a "real Maori". She suggested that "when we know who we are we can meet any challenge -- even criticism from those who will say we are not 'real'."

She pointed out that sometimes the demands of culture conflict with our responsibilities as employees and managers, and we need to be responsible in our jobs even in that conflict.

Tom Taurima explained the history of Waitangi Day and the symbolism of Maori art and carving was defined by Fay Campbell.






Pulefano Galeai delighted the crowd when he prefaced his remarks by calling the men together for an impromptu haka.

The deadline for the contest has been extended to March 26, 1987. In order to enter you need to call one of the following and they'll sign you up:



To control where the page breaks in symphony spreadsheet simply insert two dashed vertical lines () where you want the page to end

Next, go to your printer menu by pressing (F9) Print Settings Page Break and specify Yes to set your page break on.

Note that these symbols will not be printed out on your spreadsheet unless they are incorrectly done.

WORDPERFECT

In WordPerfect, simply hold down your (CTRL) key and press your (RET) key once at the place where you would like a page break. You will instantly see a dotted line inserted. Wasn't that easy? Much easier that moving your cursor down to the next page to continue, right?
