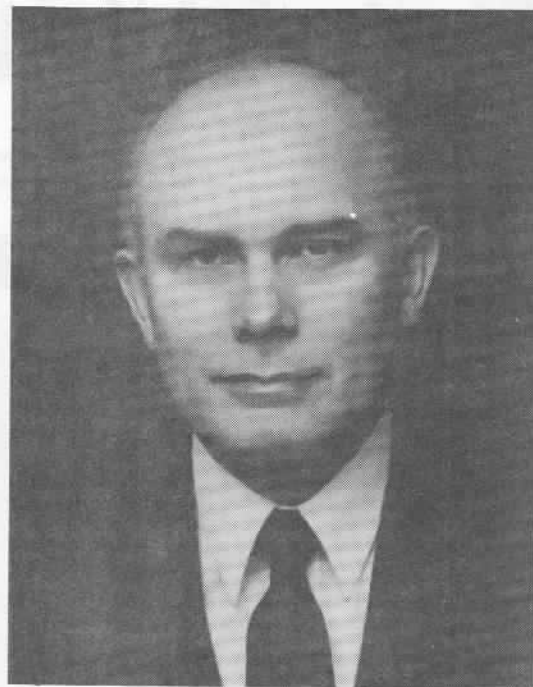

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## Conference Talks

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President Ezra Taft Benson described the conference well when he said that he's a "better man because of it". President Benson emphasized the importance of the Book of Mormon as the keystone to our religion and the Doctrine and Covenants as the "capstone" containing latter-day revelations".

The Prophet concluded his talk with his testimony and a blessing upon the Latter-day Saints and good people everywhere". The blessing included the promise of added power to endure against righteousness, an increased ability to teach and preach through diligent study of modern revelation, and increased personal revelation through increased attendance to the Temple".

President Gordon B. Hinckley reported on the great growth of the church and on the missionary work done on our temple grounds. He told of the 2.6 million people who visited the Salt Lake City Temple grounds last year and of the large number of impressed and interested referrals received.

President Hinckley spoke of the great character of Joseph Smith as testified by Brigham Young and John Taylor. He also mentioned that Brigham Young investigated the church for 2 years before joining.

Elder Marvin J. Ashton taught that "personal conduct is the only true measurement of maturity". Stating that maturity is gained by "self discipline, self resilience and continuing effort". He said that "it takes courage to flee from verbal contention" and that we should be kind to one another, tender hearted and forgiving even as God is forgiving of us.

Elder Ashton stressed that being a Latter-day Saint member is not enough; "participation...is necessary if we are to move forward". Much of his talk dealt with self image. He encouraged us to "avoid placing self labels" saying that self judgement in any direction is a hazardous pastime". Elder Ashton then re-emphasized the need for "Christ centered adult conduct".

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The daughter of Chinese Premier Deng Zhao Ping was a recent guest here at the Center.

It was a very low key affair with her party asking specifically for no publicity before or during her arrival.

President and Sister Rodgers hosted a dinner for her in their home and they attended the evening show at the Center.

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## Shopping At "The Mill"

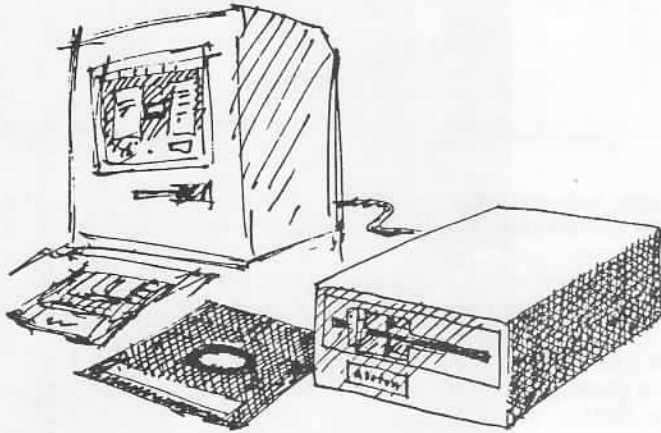
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The Kahuku Sugar Mill will soon be back in operation. Not as a mill but as "The Mill"; a shopping center.

"The Mill" will have the following: 3 business offices, 1 medical clinic, 1 bar, 1 full-service "cane train" theme restaurant, 17 retail outlets which will consist of a jewelry store, muumuu shop, shave ice, yogurt, pizza parlor, hamburger stand, cookies shop, a bank, a general post office, a small 7-Eleven style convenience store, and a North Shore produce outlet which will sell watermelon, shrimp, corn and all other locally grown produce.

Blackfield Corporation is behind this second resurrection of the mill and forecast May 1987 as their opening date. However, it is rumored that realistically it will be late summer or even early fall.

# Computer corner



**Tip For The Week**  
"Using The Date And Time"

## Symphony

To have the date change every time you enter your spreadsheet type in the formula @NOW at the desired position. You can format your date pressing F10, Format, Date, and choosing the date you desire.

## WordPerfect

WordPerfect will also install a 24-hour date and time for your documents. By pressing Shift-F5, a date menu will appear. Now, you can format the date and time just as you do in Symphony by first going to 2 for Format. Otherwise, simply press number 3 for Insert Function at the area you'd like the date to appear and you'll have your 24-hour date.

In Format, you can choose the way you'd like the Date to appear such as having either the Day Month Year (03 April 1987), or having the Month Day, Year (March 16, 1987).

(Note: If you want a comma in your date, you'll have to declare it in your format. WordPerfect shows you many different styles for displaying the date.)

To insert just the current date, choose number 1 for Insert Text, and according to the format you've chosen you'll have a line of text appear.
